Inclusive design ensures accessibility for all, encouraging intergenerational interactions and fostering a sense of belonging. By integrating safety features and educational elements, these spaces support the well-being of families and contribute to the long-term livability of cities. Ultimately, they empower youth to engage in their communities and develop into active, responsible citizens.









HOW DO WE GET THERE



Develop a Comprehensive Design Manual: Create a detailed and user-friendly manual that provides guidelines and best practices for designing public spaces that cater to the needs of infants, toddlers, children, teenagers and their caregivers.




Prioritize Outdoor Play, Physical Activity and Social Interaction: Ensure the manual emphasizes the importance of outdoor play, physical activity and social interaction as key components of a livable city, with specific design strategies that promote these activities.



Engage Stakeholders and Community Members: Meet with experts and community members, including children and teenagers, to ensure the manual reflects the needs and desires of San Diegans.
